

The operational scope of housing finance corporations is delineated, limiting activities within specific local government boundaries unless authorized by resolutions from local governing bodies. The bill places stricter conditions on bond issuance. Notably, the requirements for tax exemptions tied to multifamily residential developments now include strict adherence to designated income levels with auditing procedures. Enrolled (finally passed) version makes tax exemptions for HFCs not applicable to ESD taxes.

Relating to removal of territory from certain emergency services districts.

Remarks:

This bill introduces a new provision under Section 775.0235 of the Health and Safety Code, specifically adding Subsection (a-1), which allows for the removal of territory from certain emergency services districts based on specific criteria. The criteria for removal include: (1) the territory must be within the corporate limits of a requesting municipality; (2) the municipality must have a population of more than 10.000 but less than

19,000; and (3) the territory must be situated in a county with a population of more than 1 million and less than 1.5 million.
